

Eligible Children: Pursuant to the Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA) 42 U.S.C.§5106a, a child under three years of age involved in a Substantiated or Established incident of child abuse or neglect, must be referred to the New Jersey Early Intervention System(NJEIS) in his or her county of residence.


Rate of Referral: This graph represents the rate of referrals by month for the cumulative number of eligible children as a result of investigations completed in the federal fiscal year (October 1, 20XX – September 30, 20XX).

Ongoing Data Collection: Referrals are counted on an ongoing basis through the federal fiscal year. As a result data from federal fiscal year 2015 will change from month to month as the referral counts are updated.






Any of these youth may be receiving services. These definitions are currently being reviewed to better understand how we capture DCF's work with this population. The goal of this ongoing work is to create three meaningful categories for 18-21 year olds 1) Youth in a formal out-of-home placement setting, 2) Youth that achieved permanency, and 3) Youth that never achieved permanency.




