
Rate of Referral: This graph represents the rate of referrals by month for the cumulative number of eligible children as a result of investigations completed in the federal fiscal year (October 1, 20XX – September 30, 20XX).

Ongoing Data Collection: Referrals are counted on an ongoing basis through the federal fiscal year. As a result data from federal fiscal year 2015 will change from month to month as the referral counts are updated.

The goal of this ongoing work is to create three meaningful categories for 18-21 year olds 1) Youth in a formal out-of-home placement setting, 2) Youth that achieved permanency, and 3) Youth that never achieved permanency.


Section VII: Tracking Data after SuperStorm Sandy 10 Most Impacted Counties









